SIGNATURE COLLECTION PROCESS

Candidates Collect Signatures

A certain number of signatures are gathered by candidates to earn their place on their party's primary election ballot.



CAUCUS / CONVENTION SYSTEM PROCESS

Caucus Meeting

In the spring, you and your neighbors of the same political party gather for a neighborhood meeting called a caucus.

At the caucus meeting, everyone votes to elect delegates to represent the neighborhood at the party convention.

DELEGATES VOTE FOR CANDIDATES

After the caucus meetings, delegates vote for candidates at the party's county and state conventions. The candidates receiving at least 40 percent of the votes earn a spot in the party's primary election.



PRIMARY ELECTION

On your party's primary ballot, you will see the names of all the candidates from your party who qualified using the signature collection process and/or the caucus/convention system process.

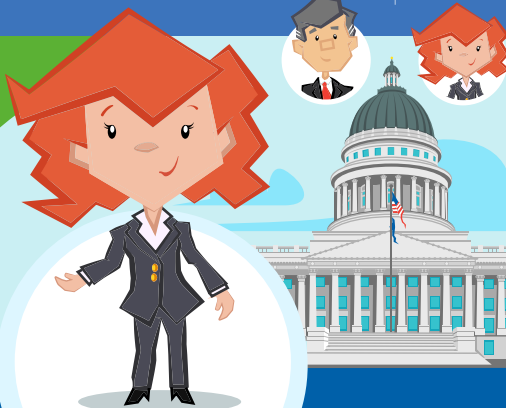
You will vote for one candidate for each available office during your party's primary. The candidate receiving the most votes from your party's voters will proceed to the general election.



GENERAL ELECTION

In the fall, voters choose from a list of candidates who won their party's primary elections.

The candidate receiving the most votes in the general election wins and will take office as an elected official.
