#### **TOPLINE REPORT**

#### METHODOLOGY DETAILS

n = 657 Online interviews fielded Jan. 20 – Jan. 31 Margin of error +- 3.8

For this survey, likely Utah voters were sampled from the Utah state voter file. Survey invitations were sent via email and text message, and interviews were completed online. The data were weighted to reflect the demographics of likely voters in the Utah 2024 general election, specifically in regard to gender, age, race, education level, political party registration, and congressional district.

Before drawing the sample, a model of general election turnout was estimated using age, party registration status, length of registration, permanent absentee status, and past election turnout. This model produces a sampling pool of registered voters that can be randomly sampled based on their likelihood of voting. A Probability Proportionate to Size (PPS) sample was drawn using this predicted turnout estimate such that voters with a higher probability of voting have a higher probability of being selected in the sample. Thus, the final sample accurately approximates a population of general election voters.

Now, we are going to ask you some questions about Ranked Choice Voting in Utah. This is a system of voting where voters can rank all candidates in the order they prefer them rather than voting for only a single candidate, and then the candidate with the lowest number of votes gets eliminated from the tabulation. If a voter's first choice is eliminated then their vote goes to their second-choice candidate, and so on, until one candidate gains a majority of the vote and is declared the winner.
