### Marriage and Work Penalties in Government Programs - November, AEI

Sutherland's Rick Larsen and Nic Dunn participated in a Washington, D.C. event with the American Enterprise Institute, where they collaborated with policy leaders from around the country to discuss social safety net and benefits cliffs reform. Rick moderated a discussion on addressing disincentives experienced by families on the social safety net, while Nic presented Sutherland's newest research publication, *Strengthening the American Dream*, which outlines how disincentives in the safety net discourage work and marriage among Utah families.

#### **Upward Mobility and Benefits Cliffs Summit** – December, Weber State University

Sutherland partnered with Weber State University and Georgia Center for the "Upward Mobility and Benefits Cliffs Summit." The event also showcased Sutherland's research on safety net reform, and featured conversations with state and national policy experts, including a special message from Congressman Blake Moore.

Both of the two preceding events elevated Sutherland leadership on work and opportunity, and generated es-

sential momentum for ongoing policy wins in 2025.

### **State Policy Network Annual Meeting**

At the beginning of August, members of Sutherland's executive team were in Phoenix for the State Policy Network's Annual Meeting. Following the remarkable success of the Defending Ideas podcast, Nic Dunn, Sutherland's vice president of strategy and communications, joined a panel that covered how to launch and maintain a policy podcast.

### **Strengthening Families Webinar Series**

Sutherland partnered with the European Union and International Affairs Office of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to host a series of 3 webinars with European and U.S. family scholars to discuss how communities and nations can support strong families in today's world.

Candice Pierucci, and Utah State Board of Education Chair Jim Moss to discuss the direction and vision of education policy in Utah and how it can better serve the needs of children and families.

Our annual Congressional Series features each member of Utah's federal delegation, giving each their own forum to interact directly with those they represent. The series facilitates constructive civic engagement and respectful dialogue as our delegation members speak on a range of critical issues.















### Sutherland's Powerful Policy Influence

Sutherland focused legislative efforts on six priority bills during Utah's 2024 general legislative session – all of which were enacted and signed by the governor.

#### HB 246 - Office of Families

Building on nearly 30 years of leadership advocating for the elevation of the family as an institution in Utah public policy debates and decisions, Sutherland drove legislation to create the Office of Families within the Utah Department of Health and Human Services to proactively promote policies that strengthen families.

### **HB 396 - Workplace Discrimination Amendments**

Sutherland contributed a powerful voice articulating the need for this legislation that prohibits an employer from requiring employees to act or communicate in ways that conflict with their religious beliefs.

### **HB 460 - Government Employee Conscience Protection Amendments**

Sutherland played a key role in helping protect the religious freedom of public employees by allowing them to request exemption from specific tasks if it does not impose undue hardship on their employer, and by providing legal protections for those making such requests.

### **SB 13 - Education Entity Amendments**

On the heels of a yearlong Sutherland effort to educate voters and policymakers about the innovative value of microschools, this legislation put home-based microschools on comparable footing with private and charter schools.

#### SB 150 - Exercise of Religion Amendments

The culmination of decades of Sutherland advocacy calling for Utah to enact a Religious Freedom Restoration Act, this legislation recognizes freedom of religion as a fundamental right and prohibits a government entity from substantially burdening a person's free exercise of religion, unless the burden is essential to furthering a compelling governmental interest by the least restrictive means.

### SJR 3 – Joint Resolution Concerning the Success Sequence

Driven by a Sutherland partnership with AEI scholar Ian Rowe, this legislation called on the state board of education to identify ways the impacts of following a life pattern grounded in education, work and strong family formation can be incorporated into state curriculum standards for students in grades 6-12.

### Rapid Audience Growth: The Defending Ideas Show

In 2023, Sutherland launched an ambitious multimedia project: a weekly audio/video podcast on some of the most critical public policy issues facing our state and nation, including constitutional law, family policy, religious freedom, education, upward mobility, and more. The show has already far surpassed 1 million views and listens and is averaging several thousand views/listens per day.

### Combination of Local and National Expertise

Guests include members of Congress, renowned national experts, state legislators, other community leaders, and Sutherland policy scholars.



### **Equipping Listeners to Make Sound Ideas Broadly Popular**

Defending Ideas fortifies voters who wish to fearlessly advocate for sound principles and defend these ideas in a way that persuades, rather than polarizes. It's a stark – and refreshing – departure from the tone that dominates much of the political and policy media landscape.

Audio and video from the 51 Defending Ideas show episodes in 2024 reached people **in all 50 states**, with concentrated audience reach in states like Utah, California, Texas, Florida, and New York.

### New Original Research on Religion, Citizen Priorities, Voting, Education, Parental Engagement, and Opportunity

### Sutherland published 9 major reports and issue briefs in 2024.

### Utahns' views on ranked choice voting: Overview of New Survey Data of Likely Voter Sentiment (February)

As Utah continues working to refine and improve how residents participate in elections, sound analysis of new voting methods based on experiential data of the voters is essential. This brief provides survey data showing that likely voters in Utah support keeping ranked choice voting as an option for municipal elections for those cities and towns that choose to use it. The support is bipartisan but favors only certain types of elections — primarily those for city office.

### Utah Voter Priorities for 2024 Election: Overview of New Survey Data of Likely Voter Sentiment (March)

This issue brief provides an overview of likely voter sentiment toward various issues that impact how they will vote in the 2024 election. Likely voters in Utah rank "kitchen table issues" like housing affordability, education funding and taxes as the most important to their vote this election year.

### What Good Does Religion Do? Social Benefits of Religion, Volume 1 (May)

This report explores how policymakers can benefit from understanding the unique social benefits of religious belief and practice. It explains how valuable social and economic contributions of religion-based organizations can easily be undermined by regulatory burdens.

### Faith and the Climate of Freedom: Social Benefits of Religion, Volume 2 (July)

Volume 2 shows how the religious teachings that motivate believers are often channeled in socially beneficial directions. It demonstrates that securing greater freedom for some need not diminish it for others. Indeed, it shows how efforts of people of faith to secure their constitutionally protected rights have made it more likely for people who did not share that faith to secure theirs.

### Views on Religion: New Survey Data Profiles Utahns' Views on Religion and Religious Freedom (July)

This brief presents the results of a Sutherland Institute/Y2 Analytics survey on whether religious freedom is a net positive for society.

### Boosting Parent Engagement in Public Schools by Strengthening Parent Access (August)

To better understand how effectively districts are making curriculum information accessible to parents, Sutherland Institute reviewed Utah's 41 school districts, using a rubric that reflects what we consider a robust threshold for parent access implementation by districts.

### The Parent-Teacher Perception Gap: How Parents and Teachers Align on Engagement and Access (September)

This issue brief looks at the experience of parents and teachers in Utah education, including parent involvement in their children's education, and how accessible curriculum and instructional materials are to parents.

#### **Education & the 2024 Election: How Utah Voters Prioritize Education Issues (October)**

This issue brief provides an overview of likely voter sentiment toward different education policy issues in the state.

### Strengthening the American Dream (November)

This report leverages new experiential data from a statewide survey to unveil how "benefits cliffs" in the social safety net disincentivize work and marriage for far too many families in Utah and beyond who are trying to achieve work-based self-reliance.

### **Expanding Partnerships**

Sutherland continues to expand and leverage partnerships with key institutions both in Utah and throughout the nation. Whether co-hosting events with the Hinckley Institute at the University of Utah, partnering with the Alliance Defending Freedom to protect religious liberty in the courts, elevating the importance of poverty policy reforms with the Alliance for Opportunity in Washington, D.C., or collaborating on an ongoing basis with AEI on a range of issues – Sutherland's profile as a premier public policy organization continues to grow.

### What's Next?

In 2025, Sutherland will build upon successes in parent-centered education policy, workforce opportunity and welfare reform, family policy, and protecting our constitutional liberties. We'll expand efforts to address poverty by removing barriers to upward mobility, explore the debates around voting and elections with sound scholarship, take on emerging tech challenges, advance parent-centered education policy, and strengthen the connection between public policy and attitudes of likely voters through ongoing original survey research.
